## **POINTS TO REMEMBER**



### **DOCUMENTS REQUIRED FOR ONLINE ADMISSION**

- i. Scanned copies of academic certificates from Matriculation (10th grade) onward must be uploaded.
- ii. A scanned character certificate issued by the head of the last attended institution is mandatory.
- iii. Applicants must provide a valid personal or family mobile number and email address, as all communication will be sent through SMS and email only.
- iv. A recent passport-size photograph (140 x 180 pixels, under 200 KB) must be uploaded.
- v. Must fill Valid APAAR ID/ABC ID and upload the same in the admission form.
- vi. Students with a gap of one year or more must accept a declaration as specified under the personal details section of the form.
- vii. Candidates from Boards other than H.P. Board must submit a migration certificate from the previous Board.
- viii. Candidates applying under the SC/ST category must upload a valid scanned SC/ST certificate to avail applicable relaxations or weightage. Students belonging to the Economically Weaker Section (EWS) must upload a valid EWS certificate online. Girls who have applied under the Single Girl Child category must upload the Single Girl Child certificate.

- ix. Those applying under IRDP, NCC, NSS, Sports, or Cultural quotas must upload relevant scanned certificates to claim benefits or relaxation.
- x. All students entering the Second Year or higher must provide their H.P. University Roll Number, ABC ID, and upload a copy of their ABC ID.
- xi. All female candidates are required to upload a scanned copy of the Bonafide Himachali Certificate to claim exemption from tuition fees, in accordance with Notification No. Edu H(8) 3 (8) 1/76 dated 29-06-2001.

### **Undergraduate Programmes Offered**

- I. B.A. (Arts):** English, Hindi, Sanskrit, Economics, Geography, Political Science, History, Mathematics, Music, Sociology, Tourism and Travel Management, Physical Education.
- II. B.Sc. (Science/Physical Science):** Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Computer Science & Application, Botany, Zoology, Chemistry.
- III. B.Com.(Commerce):** Commerce.

### **Post Graduate Programmes Offered**

1. The College is commencing **M.A. Programmes in Political Science and Sociology** from the academic session **2026–27**, thereby further expanding its postgraduate academic offerings.
2. The admission schedule for **40 seats each** in the following M.A. subjects shall be displayed on the **College Notice Board** as well as on the **College Website**:
  - M.A. English
  - M.A. Hindi
  - M.A. History
  - M.A. Economics
  - M.A. Political Science
  - M.A. Sociology
3. Admission to the M.A. programmes shall be made **strictly on the basis of merit** determined from the qualifying examination, in accordance with the rules and regulations prescribed by Himachal Pradesh University from time to time.

### **Eligibility Conditions for M.A.:**

- a) The upper age limit as on 1st July, 2026 shall be 26 years for boys, 28 years for girls, and 29 years for SC/ST candidates (both boys and girls).
- b) A candidate seeking admission to the M.A. programme must have secured either:
  - at least 45% aggregate marks in the respective subject studied during the three years of the Undergraduate Degree Programme, or
  - 50% aggregate marks in the qualifying examination.

**NOTE: -** While determining the merit 5% Weightage is given to student who studied the respective subject as an Elective subject at undergraduate level.

## **RULES FOR ADMISSION AND SUBJECT COMBINATIONS**

The admission rules and regulations shall be governed by the notifications issued by Himachal Pradesh University and may be amended from time to time.

### **A. GENERAL RULES**

1. Admission will be strictly on fulfilment of eligibility conditions.
2. Any gap in the academic career of an applicant must be supported by evidence.
3. An applicant who has passed Prabhakar is not eligible for admission.
4. Application forms must be complete in all respects along with the following documents:
  - i. Original Character Certificate from the Institution last attended. (Issued not earlier than six months).
  - ii. Self-attested copy of detailed marks certificate of the previous examination Passed.
  - iii. Self-attested copy of Matriculation Examination/ date of Birth Certificate.
  - iv. Two Passport size latest photographs of the candidate. (One to be pasted on the admission form and another to be pasted on the Identity Card).
  - v. A passport size photograph of the parents/guardian to be affixed on PTA membership form. (Guardian means only blood relation but not a present student of this college.) However, the voting right is vested only with the parents, if alive. Only parents are eligible to be elected as PTA president/member/office bearers of PTA executive.
  - vi. A copy of Aadhar Card.
  - vii. Documentary Proof must be attached for IRDP/BPL/SC/ST/CBC/Physically Challenged and Sports & Cultural Activities Participation.
5. A Student must produce original Certificates at the time of admission.
6. Candidates coming from Board/University other than H.P. Board of School Education/ Himachal Pradesh University must produce migration certificate in Original. Those who have passed first year/second year of a degree course from another University will have to produce Equivalence Certificate from Himachal Pradesh University.
7. Admission of a student is liable to be cancelled if he/she furnishes incomplete/wrong/false information or conceals any fact/facts. Disciplinary action will also be taken against such candidates.
8. Notwithstanding eligibility for admission, the principal can refuse admission if the Conduct of a student had not been up to the mark during the previous years.
9. Initially, all admissions will be provisional subject to the approval by the H. P. University. As and when University results are declared the students shall have to deposit the photocopy of the mark sheet in the office and ensure their regular Admission in their respective class.
10. A student can migrate from one college to another in accordance with the rules laid down by the Himachal Pradesh University. However, such students must obtain the approval of the concerned Admission Committee.
11. Girl student's seeking admission in any class must bring an attested copy of Bonafide Himachali Certificate to avail the fee concession. (Tuition Fee only)
12. Students seeking exemption from tuition fee for disability must attach an attested copy of 40% disability certificate.
13. Candidates seeking admission from other colleges must get clearance from Time Table Committee.
14. Candidate seeking admission for the first time in this college must be accompanied by their parents/ guardian.
15. The principal reserves the right to disallow or cancel any admission.
16. The admission will be purely on merit basis and on the number of seats allotted to each

major subject.

17. The number of seats in each major subject are 80 in case B.A. and B.Sc. whereas in B.Com. there are 140 seats available.
18. The admission will be as per 120-point roster recently notified by H.P. University.
19. Admission is open for all students on roll on basis who are otherwise eligible without waiting the final result. Roll-on system means students who appeared in 1<sup>st</sup> year will go to 2<sup>nd</sup> year & who appeared in 2<sup>nd</sup> year will go to 3<sup>rd</sup> year. He will have to fulfil all the formalities laid down by college. This will help regular teaching in time.
20. There will be no Provision of admission as per ordinance once the admission date is over as per Hon'ble High Court decision, no admission will be given after the schedule.

## **B. ELIGIBILITY FOR ADMISSION FOR THE UNDER GRADUATE (UG) PROGRAMMES**

### **B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. 1<sup>st</sup> Semester**

1. Any student who has passed +2 examination from any recognized Board established by law in India or any examination recognized equivalent thereto, shall be eligible for admission in 1<sup>st</sup> semester of 3 year degree pass course provided that
  - i. The candidates who have passed the qualifying examination with arts/humanities stream will be given preference in admission to B.A. Program.
  - ii. The candidates who have passed the qualifying examination with science stream will be given preference in admission to B.Sc. Program.
  - iii. The candidates who have passed the qualifying examination with Commerce stream will be given preference in admission to B.Com. Program.
2. An applicant must not be more than 23 years (25 years for girls) of age as on 01-07-2026 i.e., must not have been born earlier to 01/07/2003. However, in case of SC /ST students, relaxation in age up to three years is allowed as per rules. However, in case of overage Candidates, the Vice Chancellor may allow age relaxation up to six months.
3. Minimum pass percentage for admission in different faculties/programs is given below: (Change in minimum pass percentage is subject to the orders of the Himachal Pradesh University)

#### **a) Bachelor of Arts: 33%**

**NOTE: - 10+2 Students placed under compartment in +2 classes are not eligible for admission in first year of three-year degree programs in Arts/Commerce/Science.**

#### **b) Bachelor of Commerce**

- i. 33% marks for girls only
- ii. 40% marks for those boys who have passed examination under commerce group at +2 level.
- iii. 45% marks for all other boys.

#### **b) Bachelor of Science: 45%**

**NOTE: - For determining the eligibility, percentage of 0.5 and above shall be considered as 1.**

4. Relaxation of 5% marks for SC and ST students for admission to science and commerce Faculties will be given.

5. A student seeking admission to B.A. 1st Year with Mathematics as one of the subjects should have either 45% marks in aggregate or 45% marks in mathematics at +2 level.
6. Candidate having passed 10+2 examination in four subjects (including English) from any Board recognized by law can seek admission.
7. Admission is open to anybody who has passed intermediate or an equivalent examination in four subjects from any recognized Indian Board (Five in case of National Institute of Open School)
8. Only passed candidates of NIOS will be admitted if otherwise eligible.
9. Admission is also open to a candidate who has passed an equivalent examination from any foreign University subject to the approval granted either by Vice-Chancellor or by the committee authorized to determine equivalence.
10. A student with result RL (UMC) will not be given admission in the college.
11. A student failed in B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. III will not be admitted again.

## **Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes**

### **For First & Second Semester Students**

The National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 (hereafter referred to as NEP or Policy) recognizes that higher education plays an extremely important role in promoting human as well as societal well-being and in developing India as envisioned in its Constitution - a democratic, just, socially conscious, cultured, and humane nation upholding liberty, equality, fraternity, and justice for all. It notes that “given the 21st-century requirements, quality higher education must aim to develop good, thoughtful, well-rounded, and creative individuals”. In accordance with the NEP 2020, the UGC has formulated a new student-centric “Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes (CCFUP)” incorporating a flexible choice-based credit system, multidisciplinary approach, and multiple entry and exit options. This will facilitate students to pursue their career path by choosing the subject/field of their interest.

### **Transformative Initiatives that have a Bearing on the Undergraduate Education**

The NEP envisages several transformative initiatives in higher education. These include:

1. Introducing holistic and multidisciplinary undergraduate education that would help develop all capacities of human beings - intellectual, aesthetic, social, physical, emotional, ethical, and moral - in an integrated manner; soft skills, such as complex problem solving, critical thinking, creative thinking, communication skills; and rigorous specialization in a chosen field (s) of learning.
2. Adoption of flexible curricular structures in order to enable creative combinations of disciplinary areas for study in multidisciplinary contexts that would also allow flexibility in course options that would be on offer to students, in addition to rigorous specialization in a subject or subjects.
3. Undergraduate degree programmes of either 3 or 4-year duration, with multiple entry and exit points and re-entry options, with appropriate certifications such as:
  - i. UG certificate after completing 1 year (2 semesters) of study in the chosen fields of study
  - ii. UG diploma after 2 years (4 semesters) of study
  - iii. Bachelor’s degree after a 3-year (6 semesters) programme of study
  - iv. 4-year bachelor’s degree (honours) after eight semesters programme of study if the students complete a rigorous research project in their major area(s) of study in the 4th year of a bachelor’s degree (honours with research).
4. The 4-year bachelor’s degree programme is considered a preferred option since it would provide the opportunity to experience the full range of holistic and multidisciplinary education in addition to a focus on the chosen major and minors as per the choices of the student.
5. Inclusion of credit-based courses and projects in the areas of community engagement and service, environmental education, and value-based education.
6. Environment education to include areas such as climate change, pollution, waste management, sanitation, conservation of biological diversity, management of biological resources and biodiversity, forest and wildlife conservation, and sustainable development and living.

7. Value-based education to include the development of humanistic, ethical, constitutional, and universal human values of truth, righteous conduct, peace, love, non-violence, scientific temper, citizenship values, and life skills.
8. Lessons in service and participation in community service programmes to be an integral part of holistic education.

### **Main features of the New Curriculum Framework**

The new curriculum framework will have the following features:

- i. Flexibility to move from one discipline of study to another.
- ii. Opportunity for learners to choose the courses of their interest in all disciplines.
- iii. Facilitating multiple entry and exit options with UG certificate/ UG diploma/ or degree depending upon the number of credits secured.
- iv. Flexibility for learners to move from one institution to another to enable them to have multi and/or interdisciplinary learning.
- v. Flexibility to switch to alternative modes of learning (offline, ODL, and Online learning, and hybrid modes of learning).
- vi. Regulations for Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) and guidelines for Multiple Entry and Exit are already in place to facilitate the implementation of the proposed “Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes”.
- vii. **Major and Minor disciplines**

**Major discipline** is the discipline or subject of main focus and the degree will be awarded in that discipline. Students should secure the prescribed number of credits (about 50% of total credits) through core courses in the major discipline.

**Minor discipline** helps a student to gain a broader understanding beyond the major discipline.

### **Definitions, Eligibility, and Duration of the Programme Semester/Credits:**

- i. A semester comprises 90 working days and an academic year is divided into two semesters.
- ii. The winter vacation comprises five weeks. Internship/apprenticeship/work-based vocational education and training can be carried out during the winter vacation, especially by students who wish to exit after two semesters or four semesters of study. The HEIs can decide on the courses to be offered in the winter vacation depending on the availability of faculty and the number of students.

### **Awarding UG Certificate, UG Diploma, and Degree**

#### **1. UG Certificate:**

Students who opt to exit after completion of the first year and have secured 44 credits will be awarded a UG certificate if, in addition, they complete one vocational course of 4 credits during the vacation of the first year. These students are allowed to re-enter the degree programme within three years and complete the degree programme within the stipulated maximum period of seven years.

#### **2. UG Diploma:**

Students who opt to exit after completion of the second year and have secured 86 credits will be awarded the UG diploma. These students are allowed to re-enter within a period of three years and complete the degree programme within the maximum period of seven years.

**3. 3- year UG Degree:**

Students who wish to undergo a 3-year UG programme will be awarded UG Degree in the Major discipline after successful completion of three years, securing 128 credits and satisfying the minimum credit requirement.

**4. 4- year UG Degree (Honours):**

A four-year UG Honours degree in the major discipline will be awarded to those who complete a four-year degree programme with 168 credits.

**5. 4-year UG Degree (Honours with Research):**

Students who secure 75% marks and above in the first six semesters and wish to undertake research at the undergraduate level can choose a research stream in the fourth year. They should do a research project or dissertation under the guidance of a faculty member of the University/College. The research project/dissertation will be in the major discipline.

**Credit Requirements**

The minimum credit requirements to Award Degree under each category of courses as per UGC for 3-Year and 4-Year Bachelor's Programmes (Honours or Honours with Research) are given in following Table:

**STUDENT'S COURSE WISE CONTINUOUS COMPREHENSIVE ASSESSMENT (CCA) AND EVALUATION FOR THE FIRST AND SECOND SEMESTER**

The Course-wise Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA) and evaluation system for the first and second semesters is based on the provisions of the New Education Policy (NEP) 2020 implemented by Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla. Detailed guidelines and regulations regarding the assessment and evaluation system are available on the university website.

**STUDENT'S COURSE WISE CONTINUOUS COMPREHENSIVE ASSESSMENT (CCA) AND EVALUATION FOR SECOND AND THIRD YEARS (OLD STUDENTS)**

All courses (Core, DSE, and AECC& SEC) involve an evaluation system of students that has the following two components:

- a) Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA) accounting for 30% of the final grade that a student gets in a course; and
- b) Annual Examination accounting for the remaining 70% of the final grade that the student gets in a course.

**a) Continuous Comprehensive Assessment:**

This would have the following components:

**I. Classroom Attendance:**

Each student will have to attend a minimum of 75% Lectures, Tutorials and Practical's. A student having less than 75% attendance will not be allowed to appear in the annual Examination.

- i. Those having between 74% and 65% attendance will apply for exemption in a prescribed form accompanied by clear reason(s) for absence to the authorized functionaries.
- ii. Those having between 64% and 50% attendance will apply for exemption in a prescribed form accompanied by a Medical Certificate from a Government Hospital.

The exemption from 75% attendance will be given to those participating in prescribed co-curricular activities (e.g. NCC, NSS, Youth Festivals, Sports, etc.) to the extent of 25% (making the necessary attendance as 50% in the annual examination cases). However, the claim for this

exemption should be supported by authenticated certificate from the concerned college authorities.

Candidates who are getting the exemptions, except for those getting exemptions for co-curricular activities, will not be entitled for getting the CCA marks for classroom attendance as given below:

## **II. Classroom Attendance Incentive:**

Those students having greater than 75% attendance (for those participating in Co-curricular activities, 25% will be added to existing attendance) will be awarded CCA marks as follows (out of 5): -

- i. 75% to 79% - 1mark
- ii. 80% to 84% - 2 marks
- iii. 85% to 89% - 3marks
- iv. 90% to 94% - 4 marks
- v. 95% &above - 5 marks

## **III. House Examination**

There will be one house examination, to be conducted when approx. 2/3 of the syllabus has been covered. This examination will be for 15 marks and will be conducted by the college in consultation with the teachers.

In laboratory courses (having only practical (P) component), the students will be tested on the basis of laboratory exercises given by the course teacher concerned. Rest of the procedure will remain the same as above. The remaining 10 marks of the CCA will be awarded on the basis of seminar, assignment, term paper etc. that the course teacher might give to the students.

### **b) Annual Examination**

The remaining 70% of the final grade of the student in a course will be on the basis of an annual examination that will be for three hours duration and will be covering the whole syllabus of the course.

***NOTE: - Only those students will be allowed to appear in the annual examination who have been successful in the CCA.***

- i. A candidate who does not pass the annual examination in any course(s) or due to some reason is not able to appear in this examination, other conditions being fulfilled, and so is considered as 'Fail', shall be permitted to appear in such failed course(s) in the subsequent supplementary/annual examination as per the instructions issued by HP University Shimla time to time.
- ii. The registration for the annual examination will be done at the time of the enrolment for the course at the beginning of the session. The fee for the annual examination will also be collected at that time as decided by the university from time to time.
- iii. A student, who fulfills all the requirements for appearing in annual examination, is unable to appear in the examination to complete it on account of his/her own serious illness, accident, or on account of the death of near relative (mother, father, brother and sister), or the dates of state or national level examinations falls on dates of the annual examination may be allowed to appear in the annual examination in the next academic year. Permission to sit in the examination will be permitted by college Principal on the production of a valid certificate/document from the competent authority. The college will send the name of the student to the Registration and Migration Cell for information

### GENERAL REFUND OF FEE RULES

"The fee paid by students will be refunded in accordance with the refund policy prescribed by the University Grants Commission (UGC). The exact amount and timeline of the refund will depend on factors such as the date of withdrawal from the course and the applicable UGC guidelines at the time. Students are advised to refer to the official UGC refund policy for detailed information."

## **GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS FOR REALISING FEES & FUNDS**

1. Student must pay his/her dues on the dates notified from time to time.
  - a. A student will have to pay dues for 1st quarter at the time of admission.
  - b. The dues for the 2nd quarter will have to be paid as per the schedule notified by the college authority.
  - c. Failure to pay dues on due date will entail a fine of Rs. 10/- per day.
  - d. In case of non-payment of dues in advance, the name of the student will be struck off from the rolls at the end of that month.
  - e. Registration fee will not be charged from student migrating from another college, if he/she is already registered with H.P. University. Other dues will have to be paid from the month of joining this institution provided student has not paid the dues in the college from which he/she has migrated.
2. The name of a student will be struck off from the rolls of the college if he/she remains absent without leave for ten days or more in any class/subject (Theory/Practical).
3. Every student will have to procure No Dues Certificate from the Library, NCC, NSS, Sports, Hostel, College Canteen, Fee Clerk, etc. if he wants to leave the college.
4. The principal can expel a student from the college if he/she is found guilty of misconduct.
5. The security deposit will lapse if a student does not apply for refund of security within one year of leaving the college.
6. The fine claimed for absence has to be paid along with dues, while fines imposed otherwise have to be deposited by the date announced.
7. In case the name of a student is struck off for the first time the re-admission is permissible within first 10 days with a fee of Rs. 100/- on the prescribed Performa, if name is struck off for the second time re-admission is done within 7 days with a fee of Rs. 200/- in the presence of the parents. After that no re admission is allowed. For the condition of 75% attendance, the lectures will be counted from 1st official teaching day.

## **Scholarships**

## **SC/ST Girls Hostel**

A hostel for SC/ST girl students, located near the college building, has now become operational. It offers excellent residential facilities and can accommodate up to 105 girls.

## Rules for Hostel

1. **Curfew:** There is usually a specified time by which students must return to the hostel in the evening. This is primarily for safety and security reasons.
2. **Visitation Hours:** Visitors, especially of the opposite gender, may be allowed only during certain hours and in designated areas of the hostel.

1. Application Fee: Rs. 100 at the time of admission
2. Hostel Security (Refundable, to be paid one time only at the time of admission): Rs.1500
3. Hostel Charges per month (Includes electricity bill, boarding charges, misc.): Rs.1000
4. Mess Charges: According to Fixed Mess Bill.

## Library

Our library is one of the best in the region, combining a rich physical collection with modern digital learning tools.

1. **Central Library:** Features a massive collection of books and journals with dedicated subject sections. Needy students can borrow textbooks for the entire academic session upon a tutor's recommendation.
2. **Digital Library:** A modern online study hub that seats 60 students. It is fully equipped with 20 computers and 40 tablets for easy access to eBooks, e-journals, and project materials.
3. Generally, two books are issued at a time for 14 days and the librarian has the right to recall the books at any time.
4. Reference books are not issued.
5. In case of loss of books, the student will have to either replace the book or pay the fine in

addition to the present price of the books.



### **Leave Rules**

1. Student can proceed on leave mentioning specific reasons with prior permission. For this

- he/she should fill in the leave form to be supplied by the college (costing Rs. 5/- per booklet) at the time of admission.
2. A tutor can recommend leave up to three days. Leave up to one week will be sanctioned by the senior tutor. In case the senior tutor is on leave & leave for more than a week will be sanctioned by the principal on the recommendation of the tutor.
  3. Leave during House Examination will be sanctioned by the principal on the recommendation of the tutor.
  4. Leave for sickness must be accompanied by a medical certificate.

### **Annual Prize Distribution Function**

The annual prize distribution function is a cherished tradition in educational institutions where outstanding achievements and contributions of students are acknowledged and celebrated. ### **Tutorial Groups**

Every student is assigned a tutorial group as per the major subject opted by him/her. Each group is guided by the teacher of the major subject who is also the tutor for that group. The identity cards of the students will also be signed by their respective tutors. A mentoring session will be held every month for each group. During this session students can seek advice for their academic as well as personal problems.

### **Counseling & Career Guidance**

Keeping in mind the career of the students, the college runs a Career & Counseling Guidance cell. This Cell runs various campaign Programs to make the students aware of various career opportunities available to them. In this regard, seminars/guest lectures are organized by Counseling & Career Guidance Cell.

### **NCC**

NCC facility is available in the college for boys as well as girls. There are limited seats available so the recruitment is done by a selection procedure to fill the seats. The cadets who qualify 'C' certificate examination with grade 'A' or 'B' are directly called for SSB interview for entry in the forces as an Officer through "NCC SPECIAL ENTRY SCHEME" twice in a year in the months of February and October.



### NSS

The college has one unit of National Service Scheme (NSS). The enrolment of the students to NSS is done by a selection procedure. Seven days special camp will be held in the last week of December.



**NOTE:** - The students can opt either for NCC or NSS.

### **Rovers & Rangers**

Rovers & Rangers have also been introduced in the college and the students can opt for Rovers & Rangers provided, if they are not enrolled in NCC or NSS.



### **College Magazine (BINWA)**

The college Magazine “BINWA” is published to give expression to the creative talents of our student. The magazine has seven sections, each section edited by a member of the staff and assisted by a student editor.

### **Sports and Co-Curricular Activities**

The college provides excellent facilities to sports persons who wish to make in games. The college prepares teams for University Championships in almost all disciplines. A committee of teachers decides the formation of represent the college in different tournaments. No student of the college can play for an outside team without the written permission of the principal. The college also provides guidance to students in various cultural activities. There are committees which prepare students for participation in various competitions. These teams are Music (Vocal & Instrumental), Debate, Declamation, Elocution, Symposium, Quiz, Drama, Poetic Symposium & Dance. College Annual Athletic Meet may be held in the month of December, 2025.

### **Conduct and Discipline**

Discipline is the most important part of the student's life. Violation of rules and regulation will not be tolerated. The principal can impose fine, suspension or rustication of any student who is found indulging in such misconduct as is listed below.

1. Any act of ragging on or around campus will be severely dealt with.
  - i. Ragging implies harassment/physical or mental torture to another student by a

student or a group of students. Any student found associated in such notorious activities will be guilty of gross misconduct. Remember Ragging Is cognizable offence.

- ii. Anybody found guilty of writing obscene language on blackboards, walls or furniture.
  - iii. Aimlessly loitering in the verandahs, making noise or attempting to disturb classes.
  - iv. Smoking or taking drugs/ alcohol etc. in the campus.
  - v. Any attempt to damage the furniture or other property in campus.
  - vi. Bringing unwanted outside person to the campus or sitting unnecessarily within the Campus.
  - vii. Pasting posters on the walls or notices on the Notice Board without permission of the principal.
2. Students who participate in sports or other extra-curricular activities/educational Tourisms must produce written permission from their parents/guardians.
  3. All students must always carry with them their duly completed identity card which is issued to them at the time of admission. They must produce their identity cards whenever demanded by any teacher or the principal.
  4. Parents/guardians are requested to remain in touch with the principal and the concerned teachers regarding the progress of their wards in the college. Outsiders are not allowed in the college campus.
  5. Students are expected to respect teachers, staff, and other authority figures within the college.
  6. Regular attendance is mandatory. Excessive absences or truancy may result in academic penalties or disciplinary measures.
  7. Use of mobile phones in the campus is strictly prohibited. Access to inappropriate content or cyberbullying is prohibited within the college campus.
  8. Students are responsible for their own safety and the safety of others. They should adhere to safety protocols, follow evacuation procedures during emergencies, and report any safety concerns to college authorities.
  9. Clear consequences for violations of conduct and discipline rules should be outlined. These may include warnings, detention, suspension, expulsion, or other disciplinary actions as deemed appropriate by college authorities.

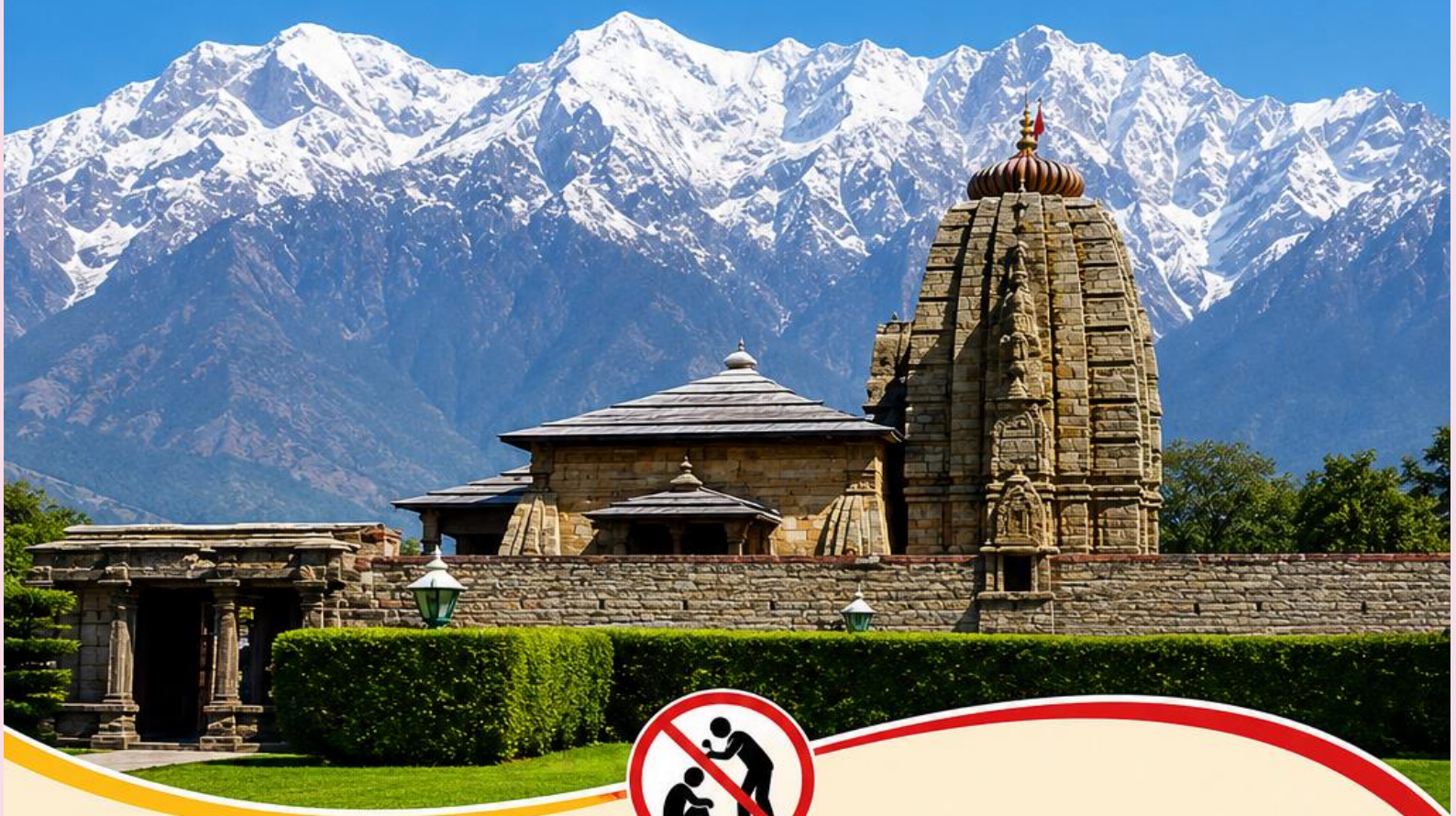
